

## ENTRY DEADLINE – JULY 1

**RULES & REGULATIONS****YOU MUST PRE-ENTER ALL EXHIBITS WITH THE FAIR OFFICE BY JULY 1****A. ENTRIES**

1. Please study these rules and special rules in each Department so that entry errors are eliminated.
2. Each exhibit you enter must be pre-entered. YOU WILL NOT BE ABLE TO BRING EXHIBITS TO FAIR THAT HAVE NOT BEEN PREREGISTERED BY JULY 1, 2011. The exhibitor must pay a late entry fee of \$25 after July 1, 2011.
3. Entries will be displayed in the Hazel Gray Building. Tags will be available when you bring your entries.
4. 4-H and Youth must pre-enter to enter Open Class Departments.
5. No change in entries will be made except to correct errors.
6. Superintendents have complete charge of entries in their sections.
7. EXHIBIT DEADLINES: Open Class Livestock: 6:00 PM Sunday, prior to fair. Open Class Non-Animal Exhibits: Noon - 5 PM Sunday, prior to fair. Exhibitors will not be charged admission. 4-H and Youth: Non-Animal Exhibits: 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM Saturday, prior to fair. Livestock: 3:00 PM Sunday, prior to fair.
8. EXHIBIT RELEASE TIMES: Open Class and 4-H Youth: Non-Animal Exhibits: 9:00 AM to 12 Noon Sunday, following fair. Livestock: 4-H: See Youth Division; Open Class: Midnight, Saturday, last day of fair. Draft horses may be released at 11:00 pm if horses are led across the street to trailers. Pony tent – 11:00 **pm** All stalls must be cleaned before leaving. Removal of any exhibit prior to the published release time without proper approval, will mean fines equal to the amount of the premium money. Approval of early release requests will follow the procedures outlined:
  - a. Request will be in writing prior to the first day of Fair.
  - b. Approval will be given jointly by the project superintendent and a majority of the Fair Board.
  - c. In emergency situations that require an early release of the project animal, unanimous approval must be obtained from (3) persons consisting of the project superintendent, the livestock committee chairperson and one of the Fair Board executive officers.
9. THE FAIR MANAGEMENT WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY LOSS OR DAMAGE, OR INJURY TO ANY ANIMAL EXHIBITED OR FOR ANY ARTICLES WHICH MAY BE LOST OR DESTROYED. All animal or articles entered must be placed under the direction of the Fair Management during the Fair. The management will use diligence to insure the safety of livestock and articles entered for exhibition or display after their arrival on the grounds but under no circumstances will it be responsible for loss, injury or damage by theft, fire, lightning, wind or by any other agency, to such livestock, article on exhibition or display, and the Fair and management thereof shall be held harmless by the exhibitors against all legal or other proceedings relating thereto. Each exhibitor will be responsible for any injury caused by an animal owned by him/her, and shall indemnify the Fair Management against all claims or demands which may arise as a result of negligence on the part of the animal exhibitor.

**B. JUDGING**

1. Competent judges will be secured to judge all exhibit entries.

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2. Superintendents are not allowed to judge their own departments.
3. Judging schedules and times are as listed in the premium book; changes may be made only with the approval of Fair Management.
4. Should judging protests arise, they must be made in writing and filed with the Fair Management by Noon of the day following the judging, together with a \$10 protest fee to be retained by the Fair Management if the protest is not sustained. A protest hearing time will be set by Fair Management with all parties notified.
5. All livestock will be shown and judged whether or not there is competition. Failure to respond promptly to the Superintendent's call to enter the show ring forfeits the exhibitor's right to compete in that Section or Class.
6. Open Class exhibit room will not be open until judging is complete.

**C. PREMIUMS**

1. Premiums will be awarded to exhibitors based upon the judging records with the judge's decision final. A premium card or ribbon placed upon an exhibit is no guarantee of an award.
2. Premiums will be awarded to exhibits deemed worthy by the judge regardless of the competition or lack thereof.
3. The Fair Management reserves the right to pro-rate premiums to eligible exhibitors, should there be a shortage of funds.
4. Premiums will not be awarded to exhibit entries not listed in the premium book.
5. Premium checks will be mailed within 30 days.

**D. GENERAL**

1. Exhibitors are not permitted to sell articles or exhibits before the close of the Fair or to place "For Sale" signs in exhibits.
2. Schedules may be subject to change. Superintendents will notify participants in such cases.
3. During the Fair (and Always) use common sense in your dealings with others. Exhibitors are to demonstrate good sportsmanship at all times. The Superintendent and/or Fair Board Directors reserve the right to refuse entry or request the removal from the Fair of anyone behaving in an unsportsmanlike manner. Stall fees and premium monies will be forfeited.
4. The Fair board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and Regulations and to settle and determine all matters, questions or differences in regard thereto. The Fair board further reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as it deems necessary.
5. All horses are subject to rules regulations as outlined in MDA Regulation No. 813 and No. 817 as amended.
6. Roller skates, roller blades, skateboards and bicycles are not to be used on the Fairgrounds. Exceptions: roller hockey rink and bicycles used to and from the Fairgrounds.

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7. The use of equipment owned by or under the control of the Kalamazoo County Fair is strictly prohibited without express permission of the Fair board. Failure to comply may result in loss of Fair privileges and expulsion from the fairgrounds.

**E. SECURITY**

1. An adequate Security Force will be maintained on the grounds day and night. Every effort will be made for the security of our exhibitors and others in attendance, but the Fair Management WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY LOSS OR DAMAGE that may occur under any circumstance.
2. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Security, day and night, respectively, to execute the orders received from the Fair president.
3. Department Superintendents, likewise, are responsible for executing orders received from the Fair president, and to preserve the order in their respective divisions.
4. The Kalamazoo County Fair prohibits demonstrations, protests, unauthorized distribution of literature, and any other disruption of activities of the Fair. Violators will be arrested and removed from the Fair grounds.
5. We are governed by state laws regarding drugs.

**F. COMPLAINTS AND APPEALS POLICY**

1. Any exhibitor may file a complaint regarding any of the following:
  - (a) Conflict of interest of the judge
  - (b) Disqualification of an exhibitor or exhibit
  - (c) Exhibitor, group leader, or superintendent behavior
  - (d) Eligibility of the exhibit

All judging results are final.

Exhibitors are allowed to file a written complaint within 10 days after the end of the fair, to the Kalamazoo County Fair Board. The appeals committee, consisting of the fair board executive committee, will review, investigate, and issue a notice of findings and recommended actions within 15 days from receipt of complaint.

If the exhibitor is not satisfied with the committees' findings, he or she may make an appeal to MDA within 45 days of filing the initial complaint. MDA shall have 60 days after receipt of any appropriately filed appeal to investigate the complaint, and shall issue a finding of fact and notice of department action and any recommended actions for the association.

**G. GOLF CARTS**

Due to congestion and insurance regulations, only golf carts (no atvs, etc) are allowed on the fairgrounds. These will be limited to Fair Business use only.

1. All carts must be registered in the campground office prior to being used.
2. Each cart will be issued a permit for use in designated areas only.
3. Carts may only be used in areas designated by their permit.
4. No carts are allowed in the Midway or in the Grandstand area after 12:00 noon except for Fair Operations & Emergency calls.
5. No carts are allowed on the Livestock Mall at any time.
6. Any golf cart left unattended with a key in it can be removed and stored.
7. Operators must be 18 years of age or older and have a valid drivers license.
8. A twenty-five dollar (\$25) registration fee must be paid in the campground office at time of registration unless proof of insurance is provided.

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9. The speed limit on the Fair grounds is ten (10) mph or less at all times. There will be a warning for first time violators. Second time violators will have their vehicle impounded for the remainder of the week.
10. All rented golf carts must be returned to the County Center Building and key turned into the Fair office by 10 PM Saturday night (last night of the fair).
11. Only perimeter routes must be used, specifically the North end of the Midway.
12. Carts may not carry more passengers than the cart is designed to carry.
13. The fair board reserves the right to revoke any golf cart permit for violations of these rules and regulations. No refunds will be made.
14. If a golf cart permit is revoked, the cart will be required to leave the premises.
15. Carts issued permits for the livestock area will be able to use their carts between the hours of 6 AM – 10 AM and 6 PM – 9 PM.
16. Carts issued permits for Commercial vendors and Concessionaires must remove their carts by 12 noon.
17. The registration permit shall be permanently fixed to the vehicle at all times and is not transferable to other vehicles.
18. The Fair board's decision on all matters is final.

Persons with medical conditions should consider renting Amigos as they are allowed everywhere on the grounds. (The Fair board doesn't rent Amigos).

We want everyone to have a safe week at the Fair and request that you comply with these simple rules.

### **H. STATEMENT OF ANIMAL CARE**

The Kalamazoo County Fair is the show place for animal agriculture for the county. All animals and livestock shown, housed, or displayed, shall receive care that is humane, healthful, and consistent with accepted practices. Animal care shall be consistent with sound husbandry practices and with rules and regulations set out by the Fair Board. Professional veterinary care will be on call and available for consultation for any animal injury or illness. Any treatment will be at the expense of the animal owner. Exhibits shall reflect the care and concern that the State of Michigan and the Kalamazoo County Fair have for livestock, poultry, companion animals, and wildlife. If questions should arise, contact current Fair Board President.

### **I. EMERGENCY MEDICAL PROCEDURE**

State licensed emergency personnel will be available on the fairgrounds to evaluate any injury or illness as needed and to offer recommendation for treatment. The location of the First Aid Station is in the Fire Barn side located near the main patron entrance next to the Hazel Gray Building.

### **J. FOOD CONCESSIONAIRES**

### **K. BOOTH RULE**

No person shall be permitted to make solicitations of any nature on the fairgrounds except in concession or commercial spaces rented under license/contract issued by the Kalamazoo County Agricultural Society a/k/a KALAMAZOO COUNTY FAIR. No person will be permitted to post or display signs, distribute handbills or

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advertising material or sell or distribute free, any merchandise, except persons under contract. Violators will be prosecuted.

**L. LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR RULES**

1. Exhibitors may enter the number of animals as specified in the respective Sections or Classes; no more than one Herd, Flock, or Pen in any one Class, unless stated otherwise in the Department Rules.
2. Superintendents of each Livestock Department have complete charge of their Department, as per above rules, including assigning stall space.
3. All equine must have an official veterinary statement or health papers available, indicating NEGATIVE COGGINS TEST REQUIRED BY STATE. All purebred livestock must be registered or accepted for registry in their respective herd books or breed associations. All livestock (purebred) **MUST** be registered in the name of the exhibitor and the registration papers must be made available upon request of the Superintendent.
4. Livestock exhibitors are required to keep their exhibit areas neat and clean. Failure to do so could result in forfeiture of earned premiums. Barns and exhibit areas will be inspected daily after 10:00 AM All stalls must be cleaned before leaving.
5. Animals cannot compete for more than one cash award or prize or be entered in more than one Class except for Group Classes. (Exception: See YOUTH DIVISION - GENERAL RULES.)

**LIVESTOCK DRUG TESTING POLICY**

ANY ANIMAL ENTERED IN ANY CLASS AT THE FAIR MAY BE SUBJECTED TO DRUG TESTING at the discretion of the Fair Board President, Livestock Superintendent and/or judge. The Fair's veterinarian/authorized representative may collect urine, blood, hair, tissue and/or other test samples as needed. Disqualification will result in voiding of the placing(s) of the animal(s) in question, forfeiture of any and all premiums/ribbons/trophies/special awards earned with the animal(s), voiding of the sale(s) if the animal(s) has already been sold in the 4-H market livestock sale and disbarment of the exhibitor from exhibiting in open or 4-H classes at the Kalamazoo County Fair for a period of here three (3) years. Other animals will not be moved up in placing.

The cost of testing will be absorbed by the fair board unless the test produces a "positive result". The cost will then be paid by the owner and/or exhibitor.

**LIVESTOCK COLLECTION PROCEDURES****Prior to Fair**

1. Request the animal drug testing supplies from the MDA Laboratory Division, at least thirty days prior to the event. The request must be made by mail or fax (517) 337-5094. For questions or information contact Gina Dewitt, Equine Drug Testing Section at (517) 203-1356 or (517) 337-5082.

*Note: The fair has legal authority to require drug testing under the Animal Industry Act, Act 466 of 1988, as amended, in Section 40 (3): "A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority may require additional testing or vaccination of animals before entry and during the fair, exhibition, exposition or show."*

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**At the Fair**

1. Verify the animal you are about to test. Identify any tattoos, ear tags or ear notches that are on the animal. Whenever possible use USDA official identification vs. farm identification. Be sure to include this information on the “Sample Tag”.
2. Present the container for examination to the animal representative/exhibitor, making sure to verify with the animal representative that the security seal has not been previously broken. If the sample container is rejected for any reason, use another container and return the defective one to the laboratory.  
*Note: The animal representative must remain with the animal at all times during the sample collection process.*
3. Record the seal # in the top right box of the Sample Transmittal Packing List.
4. Open the container by pressing upward on the tab marked open, breaking the seal
5. Place the container in the catching stick: fold the lid back and anchor it under the metal finger welded onto the handle.
6. If a urine sample cannot be obtained, a Michigan Licensed Veterinarian/Veterinarian Technician may collect five tubes of blood from the animal. Each tube of blood must be identified with one of the six small sticker tags provided on the “Sample Tag”. Place the five labeled blood tubes inside a plastic sample container and seal as described below.
7. After collecting the sample, close the lid and snap it completely shut. Loop the barbed plastic strip on the sample container through the two holes in the container tabs and pull snug. Apply a short piece of evidence tape across the protruding end of the plastic barbed strip and also across the lid and down sides of the container.
8. Complete the information on a “Sample Tag” substituting the name of the fair for “Track”, the name of the animal (Grand Champion Steer, Reserve Champion Swine, etc.) for “Horse” and the ear tag number or other unique identification number for “Tattoo”. After the animal representative has watched the sample collection and sealing, they must sign under “Witness” on the sample tag. The person collecting the sample must sign under the “Sampled By” on the “Sample Tag.”
9. Place one completed large sticker tag from the top of the “Sample Tag” on the top of the sample container over the evidence tape and the other completed large sticker tag on the side of the container. The remaining portion of the completed “Sample Tag” must be kept and NOT returned to the lab.
10. Lock the sealed and labeled sample container in a metal can.  
*Note: Once the can is locked it cannot be opened until it reaches the lab.*
11. Samples must be held secure and cold until transferred to the laboratory.  
*Note: Urine may be frozen, blood must be kept refrigerated and never be frozen.*
12. Any discarded needles should be placed in an approved “Sharps” container by the veterinarian/veterinarian technician.
13. When all sample collection has been completed, fill out the “Sample Transmittal Packing List.” The packing list must identify the tag number of all samples included in the case. Enclose the completed “Sample Transmittal Packing List,” any unused supplies and regenerated/refrozen freezer packs in the case and seal it with the provided intact case seal.

**AFTER SAMPLE COLLECTION IS COMPLETED**

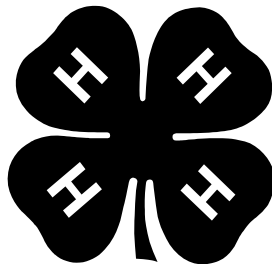
1. Transport samples to the lab either in person or by overnight express. Arrange samples to arrive at the lab during normal business hours (7:30 am-5:00 pm, Monday through Friday). The lab is located on the campus of Michigan State University at: 1615 South Harrison Road, East Lansing, MI 48823.

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2. Collect and retain signed Animal Certification Forms and the remaining portion of the completed “Sample Tag”.

*Note: Both of these documents should be kept in a secure place for cross-reference when sample results are received. In the event of a positive result these documents must be kept as evidence.*

**GENERAL RULES FOR YOUTH DIVISION**

**EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY** - Entry in the 4-H/FFA & OTHER YOUTH DIVISION is open to all youth ages 5-19 by January 1 of current year who are duly enrolled members of a Kalamazoo County 4-H Club or FFA chapter, or who are non-group youth residing in Kalamazoo County. 4-H and FFA members and non-group youth must enroll with the Michigan State University Extension Office, Kalamazoo, Michigan by April 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year.

1. The 4-H Youth and FFA Exhibitor entries may not be made in a section unless the projects were completed during the past year. Winter and summer projects are eligible.
2. Exhibits are to be the bonafide property of the exhibitors.
3. Exhibitors may not place "For Sale" signs on any projects while exhibited at the fair.
4. Exhibitors are permitted to enter cash classes only once. (Some exceptions are made in the Livestock areas. Please consult those departments). Ribbons will be awarded for all A, B, C classes listed unless otherwise specified.
5. All still exhibits are to be entered 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, Saturday, August 7, 2010 (including Livestock Notebooks and posters) in the Youth Exhibit Area. All livestock must be in place by 3:00 PM, Sunday, August 8 and must remain until the scheduled release time.
6. Exhibits judged incomplete will not receive ribbons or premiums. Exhibits which meet requirements but which are not judged worthy of premiums will receive "Award of Merit" ribbons which do not carry any premium.
7. Only members earning a blue ribbon and are present will be eligible for a purple (outstanding) ribbon or a lavender (meritorious) ribbon.
8. Should Still Exhibit judging protest arise, they must be made in writing and filed with the 4-H Office by 3:30 PM the day of judging.
9. **RELEASE OF EXHIBITS** Livestock exhibits will be released as follows: **STALLS MUST BE CLEANED BEFORE YOU LEAVE.** Rabbits, Poultry, Goats, Feeder Calves – 5 am Sunday, Breeding stock for beef & sheep, horses, ponies – 11 pm Saturday, Market Animals – midnight, Draft horses – midnight (11 pm if

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horses are led across street or by horse arena). All other will be released as determined by Project Superintendent. All other 4-H exhibits will be released only from 8:00 AM to 11:00 AM Sunday following fair week. Premiums will be forfeited if exhibits are removed before the time specified without Extension 4-H Youth Educator, Superintendent, and Fair Board approval.

10. All livestock exhibited must comply with all State Health Regulations as set forth in general regulation section. Check the front of Fair Book.
11. All Swine Members must be PQA certified.
12. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to check all livestock entries in with the 4-H Superintendents. If at all possible, these exhibits will be housed in the 4-H livestock buildings on a space available basis.
13. Any deviation from arrival check-in and check-out schedule needs to be approved by the appropriate superintendent.
14. 4-H sponsored trophies and awards are available to 4-H members only. All winners of 4-H awards, trophies and members selling livestock MUST send "Thank you" notes.

***All livestock members are required to attend this meeting Thursday, August 4 at 6:00 PM in respective livestock barns.***

**4-H LIVESTOCK SALE**

The 4-H Livestock Sale is to be held on Thursday, August 11 at 9:00 AM. All animals offered for sale must be listed with the 4-H Youth Department. Any exhibitor with market animals may withdraw his/her animal from the sale no later than 10:00 AM Wednesday before the sale. Special arrangements for the withdrawal must be made with the County 4-H Office. A six (6) percent [three (3) percent for beef only] commission will be deducted from the bid price of each sale. These funds will be placed in an account administered by the 4-H Livestock Superintendents. This account will provide for the cost of doing Auction Sale business, uncollected buyers accounts, and educational opportunities for livestock project youth. Check-off or project deduction may also be deducted where required. Members are allowed only four (4) market sales.

**4-H MASTER SHOWMANSHIP**

The Master Showmanship competition will be held at 6:00 PM, Friday, August 12, in the Livestock Arena. The following rules will apply:

1. The Top Showman from each of the following divisions will be eligible to compete for Master Showman: Beef, Dairy Feeder Calves, Dairy, Goats, Horses, Sheep, Swine, Rabbits and Poultry (chickens). In every department, the first and second place winners of each showmanship class will compete for Top Showman.
2. An exhibitor may win the Master Showmanship trophy only once.
3. The Superintendents will pick the one animal that will be shown.
4. Each species will be judged, ranking the competitors on their ability to handle and present the animal, appearance of the contestant, and the contestant's ability to follow the judges' instructions.
5. Each contestant will be ranked on each species on a basis of 50 points by the judge.
6. If a competitor has won in two different showmanship classes, he or she will then pick the species they want to show. The second place showman of the species not chosen will be eligible.
7. All animals MUST be clean and prepared as if they were going to be shown in a showmanship class.
8. All contestants MUST wear appropriate footwear, presentable blue jeans and the shirt that is provided (no hats).
9. Final placing will be based on total points, highest number to prevail.
10. Ties will be broken as follows: In the event of a tie the competitor with the highest score on the test given by the coordinator shall be the winner.

**Rules**

**Thanks you notes must be turned in before the show. Notes need to be addressed and stamped.**

1. Each contestant will show each specie for a limited amount of time. At the end of the time limit, the contestant will move on to the next specie.
2. The competition will conclude when each contestant has showed each specie.
3. Time allowed: contestants will be allowed 3 minutes for showmanship of each specie.
4. Each judge will be provided a judge's score card and the criteria for judging.

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5. The scores from each specie will be added and the contestant with the highest combined score will win.
6. Contestants will be judged on their showmanship, knowledge of the specie and related industry.
7. Each exhibitor will first present their animal which they qualified with and the animal. however, one rotation will take place as exhibitor will show the animal they qualified with last.

**GENERAL 4-H LIVESTOCK JUDGING CONTEST**

A Livestock Judging contest may be conducted on Saturday, August 13 at 1:00 PM in the Livestock Arena. All county 4-H members enrolled in 4-H livestock and all FFA members in the county are eligible to compete. First through sixth place rosettes will be awarded in the following age divisions:

- Junior, 9 through 13
- Senior, 14 through 19
- Adult, over 19

There will be four of each species and participants will be allowed fifteen (15) minutes per class. The awards will be presented on the basis of the total score of the following eight classes:

Space will be determined by the superintendents, a lotto system will be used to decide which exhibitors may exhibit four market animals. This will be determined in July after fair enrollment is in. Please consider this when purchasing pigs in the spring. All animals exhibited must be in the possession of the exhibitor by May 1 of current year.
